Surgery for Pancreatic Cancer

Pancreatic surgery at early disease stages is the best chance of cure. Despite this, more than half of the patients with resectable disease, do not receive surgery for various reasons. In the patient group considered initially unresectable, approximately 1/3 of the patients can be resected following neoadjuvant therapy.

Pancreatic cancer surgery with vascular resection: current ...

A resection is a major operation. It is only suitable for people with early-stage pancreatic cancer who are fit enough to cope with a major operation. In some people surgery may cure the cancer. Occasionally, it may be possible to remove a cancer that has spread to nearby blood vessels. You usually have chemotherapy first to try and shrink the cancer.

Types of surgery for pancreatic cancer - Macmillan Cancer ...

Operative mortality rates for pancreaticoduodenectomy are now <5% at major centers, and the average length of hospital stay has been reduced to <2 weeks. Improvements in patient outcome after pancreatic cancer surgery have made possible, for the first time, the design and conduct of large adjuvant therapy studies in pancreatic cancer.

Where will I have pancreatic cancer surgery? In the UK, surgery should only be carried out in specialist centres where there is a specialist team to treat pancreatic cancer. Surgery is done by surgeons who are experienced in

pancreatic surgery and who usually do at least 12 of these operations a year.

Chemotherapy for borderline operable pancreatic cancer Occasionally, the cancer may grow very close to major blood vessels near the pancreas. You may be able to have surgery, but this depends on which blood vessels are affected by the cancer, and how far the cancer has grown. This is called borderline resectable pancreatic cancer.

Most pancreatic cancers are exocrine cancers. Pancreatic neuroendocrine tumors (NETs), or islet cell tumors, are less common but tend to have a better outlook (prognosis).. If you have pancreatic cancer or are close to someone who does, knowing what to expect can help you cope.

Surgery for tumors in the pancreatic body and tail. Surgery to remove the left side (body and tail) of the pancreas is called distal pancreatectomy. Your surgeon may also need to remove your spleen. Surgery to remove the entire

The Japanese Society of Hepato-Biliary-Pancreatic Surgery published a series including 58 patients with initially unresectable PDAC who underwent 8 months of neoadjuvant treatment followed by [adjuvant resection] which resulted in clearly improved survival times compared to a palliative approach, illustrating the important role of neoadjuvant treatment in conversion surgery (30).

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
